Pacific National WA Cherub Championships

For the third year in a row Steve and Blake Vance on Serenity Now from Perth Dinghy Sailing Club have won the Pacific National WA Cherub Championships. Off to a shaky start, the boys found their form after heat 2 winning 6 out of the remaining 8 heats. After such a successful career in Cherubs, the Vance cousins will concentrate on sailing their 14 foot skiff.

Second place was tied between Cam Rule and Cain McVee on Cuning Linguist from Mounts Bay Sailing Club and Brennan Stead and Elliot Mahar on Fine Mess from Perth Dinghy Sailing Club. On count back however, Cuning Linguist won out taking the runner up position again. The 10 race championship was held over four months at Mounts Bay Sailing

Club, Perth Dinghy Sailing Club, Koombana Bay Sailing Club and Mandurah Offshore Fishing and Sailing Club. The sailors were treated to some strong wind, in particular a 20 knot plus offshore breeze at Mandurah Offshore Sailing and Fishing Club. In fact the last race on the Sunday was cancelled due to dangerous conditions.

Highlighting the gnarly conditions, heat 7 saw Cunning Linguist, then Fine Mess both cart wheel just before the downwind finish line. Cunning Linguist managed to still win the race, however whilst Fine Mess was 1 metre away from floating through

the line Serenity Now flew past and took 2nd position. Alistair Standing and Rachel Jones on *Juicy* showed glimpse of brilliance by sailing for survival in the heavy offshore wind in Mandurah to place 2nd in heat 6 and then by winning heat 10 at Mounts Bay Sailing Club by demonstrating tactical superiority in the light conditions.

The social side of the competition was, as always, just as exciting as the racing. The sailors enjoyed the weekend stays, particularly visiting the clubs and pubs in Mandurah and Bunbury.

Square Top Mainsail Trial

The Cherub National Council has endorsed the construction of a number of experimental "Square Top" mainsails during the 2011-12 season.

At the Annual General Meeting held in Adelaide during the National Championships, the Council agreed that a number of experimental sails should be built to allow the class to judge the merits of moving to mainsail roach profile more in line modern "Square Top" designs. The aim is to up date the look of the class and keep it in touch with current sail developments in other high performance classes.

The experimental sails will be made to test the performance characteristics of a square top on current masts and to develop the details measurements needed for a future rule change. It is expected that experimental sails will be made in Sydney, Belmont, Perth and possibly Brisbane.

If the experiments are successful, a new set of cross width measurements will be developed and the amended rules will be put to Cherub owners in a "remit" during the 2012 winter. All registered Cherub Owners will be entitled to vote on the remit. If the remit is passed the new rules would come into force for the 2012-13 season and the 50th Anniversary Nationals to be held at Belmont.

The Cherub mainsail profile was last changed in 2006 and the intention of the Council is to give all Cherub owners plenty of advance notice of this next possible change.

NSW State 2010-11 Championship Wrap

The final round of the NSW Cherub State Championships was raced at Lane Cove 12ft Sailing Skiff Club and Yarra Bay 16ft Sailing Club on the weekend of 5 and 6 March. The final two races were tense affairs with first and second place overall up for grabs between the two leading boats and third also very open.

Saturday's race at Lane Cove on Sydney's upper harbour was sailed in a gusty south easterly that topped 20kts at times. The breeze, plus the normal upper harbour traffic, made the race a tactical affair with several changes of leadership. Local Lane Cove skipper Alison Chapman, who was the stand in skipper for *Enough Rope*, showed that despite having been out of the class for twelve months, she still has the touch to sail a Cherub fast. Working the gusts and shifts up the long first work she had *Enough Rope* close to the early leaders Lawrence Wakefield and Oliver Jones from Drummoyne in *The Black Pearl*. The two leading boats then played out a race long duel with places swapping regularly. Behind them the Championship was being fought out between current National Champions Trevor Fay and Nathan Chipchase in *The French Tickler* and Kris Fay and Liam Doyle in *Wally*. At the finish of the race it was Alison Chapman and Tom Drury in *Enough Rope* who held on to win, proving Chapman to be the master of the upper harbour. On the last downwind leg *Wally* slipped

through *The Black Pearl* in to second place, with *The French Tickler* back in fourth.

The result set up a dramatic final race, with Trevor Fay on *The French Tickler* need to beat his son Kris Fay on *Wally* to take the series. The two were guaranteed the top two places.

On Sunday the fleet moved to Yarra Bay for the final showdown and faced a steady 10 to 15kt south easterly and flat seas. Brett and Ryan Lancaster on *Causing Haavik* made the most of the first work to set up a very narrow lead over *The Black Pearl* and Claire and Rolf Lunsmann on *Alchemy*. Well back in the fleet were *The French Tickler* and *Wally* who were sailing their own private race. At the bottom of the second run Tim and Nick Harrington on *Cauchemar* passed *Causing Haavik* and were never headed, sailing away to a convincing win that saw the take third place overall in the series. *Causing Haavik* held on to second with *Alchemy* finishing third. In the all important series decider *The French Tickler* did enough to sneak into fifth place, three places ahead of *Wally*. This result gave Trevor Fay his ninth NSW State Championship spread over fourteen years.

Overall, despite the clear points gap between the first two boats and the rest of the fleet, the series saw five different crews win races in a fleet where, in

Elsewhere on the thirty five boat final result sheet John Sanderson gained family bragging rights by beating his **SON** Alex and Mark Holt, who sails with his **SON** Paddy up front, triumphed over the boat crewed by his **DAUGHTER** Sophie. John Sanderson's crew Jessica Stephenson lost out overall to the boat crewed by her **BROTHER** Andrew while Aaron Kirkby scored a win over the boat steered by his **BROTHER** Stuart.

The results speak for themselves and prove that family connections can take you to the top of the tree even in athletically demanding, and fun boats like Cherubs.
