What a Classic!

Can you top 21.5kts

There was very tight racing between the 27 Cherubs that contested the first three heats of the 2005/06 NSW State Championship at Belmont on 12-13 November. Each of the three races was won by a different boat.

In Heat 1, the first of two short races on Saturday, Fortune Faded showed the benefit gained from its offseason refit and new rig to build a healthy lead at the first mark and hold on for a great win in front of Wally and Everything Zen.

Heat Two saw Trevor Fay use his local knowledge to pick a big lift to the left on the first work, establishing what was to be a winning lead at the first mark.

Wally eventually won from Camel Toe and Pocket Rocket.

In the long race on Sunday Caroline Phillips and Nigel Hale in their brand new boat *Pocket Rocket* got to the front early. In only the third race for their new boat built by Dennis Phillips, they held their narrow advantage to the finish beating Wally by a handful of boat lengths.

Another notable performance in the longer race came from Josh Doyle and Tom Drury in *Rocky-N-Bullwinkle* who finished 16th beating many newer boats and more experienced crews.

All three races were sailed in 10-12kt shifty easterly breezes that tested all the competitors strategic skills. The next three heats of the Championship will be held at Jervis Bay.

Jervis Bay Regatta

Eight Cherubs fronted the start line for the 2005
Jervis Bay Regatta on the NSW October long weekend. The top Cherubs put on another great performance in mixed fleet racing by finishing in 3rd, 4th and 5th places in their Division.

Adam Forbes and Chad Booth finished third overall in the Monohull Division with Andrew Stewart and Amy Smith close on their heels in fourth and Simon and Nigel Blatchford fifth.

Among the boats behind the leading Cherubs were former World Flying Dutchman champions Fred McCrossin and James Cook and NSW Sharpie Champion Rick Outhred.

The Regatta dished up a wide variety of conditions with little wind evident on Day One and enough on Day Two to see as many as 5 boats upside down at any one time.

Races four and five featured some good stacks. Including *Moe's Tavern*

which ran into the start boat and also managed to put its long suffering crew, on trapeze, between the 2 hulls of a capsized Hobie cat

The event confirmed Jervis Bay's status as one of the finest sailing venues on the east Australian coat. It's open spaces, good clear breeze paths and flat waters make for great racing.

What a Classic!

Wop sailed by Phil "Bugs" Smith and Vicky Weeks was one of the most influential Cherubs ever built in Australia. Wop's hull design represented a major breakthrough when it was launched in 1980. Subsequent designs such as the Foreign Affair and the early O'Mahoney boats were based on Wop's in-

novative lines. Wop was designed by Phil's brother Mal and featured deep section in the middle of the boat allowing it to float higher and lift the chines out of the water.

With Phil at the helm and Vicky as crew *Wop* ran a close third at the 1980 World Championships held

in Feltham, UK and then went on to win the Australian Championship in 1980/81 at South Perth.

Today *Wop* is still in active service. Now fitted with a concave deck and asymmetric kite it is being sailed by Grant Abbott and his 12 year old son as part of the new fleet of Cherubs at the Mandurah Offshore Fishing and Sailing Club, south of Perth.

The boat is again under the watchful eye of the local Mandurah sailmaker, non other than "Bugs" Smith.

Can you top 21.5 kts?

On 8 October, with the Weather Bureau recording 27kts on Sydney Harbour and gusts of 35kts, three Cherubs braved the conditions for the Lane Cove club race. Two managed to make it to the start line. South Park soon built up a big lead simply by staying upright at the start, but at just the second mark she was forced to retire with her jib shredded. Meanwhile Tony Sheldon and Ewan Duckworth in Moe's Tavern had returned to

shore, replaced their torn mainsail, and set out on the race again to complete the course and become the only finisher.

On one downwind leg *Moe's Tavern* managed to clock a maximum speed of 21.5 kts on their GPS.

Can anyone top this as a maximum speed in a Cherub?

The Cherub is a 2 person 12ft high performance racing skiff with spinnaker and trapeze. Cherubs are very quick craft offering exciting rides particularly downwind with their large asymmetric kites. The majority of Cherub sailors are in their late teen or early twenties but the flexibility of the class and the Cherub's great sailing qualities mean that there are also attractive to many older sailors. Many women sail Cherubs, both a skippers and as crews and husband/wife, boyfriend/girlfriend, brother/sister and parent/child combinations of crew are common.

The Cherub is a 'restricted' class as distinct from a 'one design' class. This feature gives amateur builders flexibility in complying with maximum and minimum measurement restrictions, and also permits boats to be rigged and tuned to allow for a wide range of crew sizes.

Competitive crew weights range from the very light 110 kg to the heavies of around 150-160kgs.

The NSW Cherub Association conducts an active program of interclub racing events to which all registered Cherubs are welcome. The Association also hosts a number of social events to which all Cherub sailors including sailors of "Classic" older boats are welcome.
